Leveraging New Partnerships in Continuous Improvement: Assessment Leaders, Faculty, and Instructional Designers as Joint Collaborators – Terrance Cao and Dr. Jennifer Miyake-Trapp, Pepperdine University

Assessment leaders traditionally interact with faculty members throughout formal assessment processes. Meanwhile, instructional designer roles have expanded in college and university campuses. Emerging literature has highlighted possibilities for instructional designers to be involved in non-instructional processes, including program quality assurance. This session will provide an overview of the roles of instructional designers and a sample assessment plan involving contributions from instructional designers. The audience will also engage in discussions about ways that assessment leaders, faculty members, and instructional designers can jointly collaborate to streamline the formal assessment process.

### <u>Presentation 2:</u> College Assessments: Fulfilling a goal-driven, objectives-based academic career – Randy Larkins and Chad BeBee – University of Northern Colorado

Although assessment as a concept has been known for many years, it is still viewed as an unnecessary and overburdensome exercise of little practical use to academic programs and student achievement. However, it is our position that the need for effective program assessment in colleges and universities is greater than ever. If undertaken correctly, the assessment process is the bridge between students completing a list of degree requirements and students fulfilling a goal-driven, objectives-based academic career. In this session, we will describe how our assessment director and the ASRM department chair worked together to form program learning outcomes for students in our program, including a new look at objectives in syllabi to give meaning to our classes, and practical, naturally occurring assessments that will enhance students' resumes when they graduate.

Thinking Big: Scaling Up Assessment Effectively Kris Acheson-Clair, PhD., Purdue University

Whether at the course, program, department/unit, or institutional level, your assessment practices might benefit from thinking bigger. Scaling up, in different contexts, could mean combining or comparing multiple cohorts over time, coordinating with teammates and/or external colleagues, gaining institution-wide support for assessment initiatives, or sharing your results with a larger audience. Regardless, achieving success when thinking big requires planning, relationship building, and other key strategies. We'll examine case studies from Purdue University's efforts to assess intercultural competence development and global learning in order to extract practical lessons and guiding principles for scaling up assessment.

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<u>Presentation 2:</u> A Discussion about High Impact Practices at Urban and Rural Community Colleges - Dr Matt Garcia, Red Rocks Community College and Leslie Weinsheim, Northeastern Junior College (PANEL Discussion)

This session explores the use of CAS Standards for program assessment. The session will begin with a presentation highlighting the importance of CAS (Council for the Advancement of Standards) Standards and Red Rocks Community College's journey in integrating them into program assessment. Following the presentation, engage in a dynamic roundtable discussion, where you can interact with fellow attendees. This exchange will encompass Q&A, sharing best practices, and exploring effective strategies for applying CAS Standards within your own institution.

<u>Presentation 4:</u> Institutional Student Learning Outcomes ZERO to SIXTY-How Northeastern completed FIVE Rubrics in FIVE Months – Veronica Koehn and members of the NJC Assessment Leadership Team – Northeastern Junior College.

NJC had a HLC 4-year review in early 2023. We received a "Met with Concerns" for Criterion 4B, which was not surprising, given NJC's assessment history. However, HLC noted that NJC had made marked improvement in its assessment between Fall 2021 and the time of the review in February 2023, including faculty-led creation of five Institutional Learning Outcomes (ISLOs) and the creation of a rubric for the Communication ISLO. The Assessment Leadership Team (ALT) created a Diversity rubric in the Spring of 2023.

At the Fall 2023 in-service, the faculty had a 3-hour assessment session where they used the existing NJC Communication and Diversity rubrics and the VALUE rubrics to draft rubrics for the other ISLOs. The ALT then worked on minor revisions to the rubrics and shared them back out with faculty at the Spring 2024 in-service. This process ensured that faculty were directly involved in the rubric-creation process, which should help with buy-in when it comes to using the rubrics for assessment.

In this session, we will share our process, what we learned, and where we hope to go from here.
